Dik Daso will talk about "Marshall, Arnold and the Creation of American Airpower" beginning at 5:30 p.m. on May 12 in the Pogue Auditorium at the George C. Marshall Foundation in Lexington.

His presentation will kick off the George C. Marshall Legacy Series sequence on "Speed and Fury." Guests can see the exhibition "From Machine to Man" that will open that evening.

Daso is a U.S. Air Force Academy graduate and a retired Air Force fighter pilot. He received a Ph.D. in history from the University of South Carolina. For 10 years he served as the curator of Modern Military Aircraft at the Smithsonian's Air and Space Museum. He teaches 20th century American history at the University of South Carolina.

Introducing The First Rockbridge History Bee

High School Event Slated For Dec

There have been spelling bees. There have been history bees. But there's never been a Rockbridge History Bee.

But thanks to the Rockbridge Historical Society, area high school students will now have the opportunity to learn about their local history, their neighborhoods, even some of their distant ancestors, all while competing for substantial prizes, and a good dose of civic pride.

The one-day competition, scheduled for Friday, Dec. 3, at Kendal's Anderson Hall, will include all ninth- through 12th- graders at Parry M. High School, Rockbridge County High School, Rockbridge Christian Academy, Ben Franklin Learning Center, as well as local home-schooled students. This pilot program, said RHS Executive Director Eric Wilson, is designed to anchor studies in U.S., Virginia and world history by highlighting how those historical developments did or didn't play out in their community, and
